

We strive to be an LGBTQ safe space and to live out our anti-racist principles in word and deed. The sacrament of Holy Communion is open to all who seek to know God in Christ. Come to the feast!

A Word from Rev. Sean about Inclusive & Expansive Language

This month, we are expanding our efforts to become more intentional about our use of inclusive and expansive language in worship, a longstanding commitment here at St. Mary's.

Moving forward, our liturgies will retain references to God as *Father* in only a few texts – most notably the Creed and the Lord's Prayer – which are historical and ecumenical texts. When saying a Creed or praying the Lord's Prayer, you are welcome to substitute other ways of naming God if *Father* does not resonate for you. We will also retain the traditional trinitarian baptismal formula of "Father, Son, and Holy Spirit," which is necessary for baptisms performed at St. Mary's to be ecumenically valid. Otherwise, we will be striving to reduce the use of gendered language for God in our liturgical texts.

In spite of the above efforts, masculine names and pronouns for God will continue to appear in our scripture readings and in our hymns. There is currently no mainstream Bible translation that reduces or eliminates masculine language for God; however, St. Mary's does use the *St. Helena's Psalter*, which dramatically reduces the use of gendered language in the Psalms. In terms of hymnody, the Episcopal Church is not currently planning to revise our denomination's primary hymnal, *The Hymnal 1982*. When we use music from other resources, however, selecting inclusive language hymn texts will continue to be a strong priority.



Contemporary Testimonies for Pride Month

an excerpt from Sister Outsider: Essays and Speeches a book by Audre Lorde

The very word erotic comes from the Greek word eros, the personification of love in all its aspects — born of Chaos, and personifying creative power and harmony. When I speak of the erotic, then, I speak of it as an assertion of the lifeforce of women; of that creative energy empowered, the knowledge and use of which we are now reclaiming. [...] The erotic functions for me in several ways, and the first is in providing the power which comes from sharing deeply any pursuit with another person. [...] We have been raised to fear the yes within ourselves, our

deepest cravings. But, once recognized, those which do not enhance our future lose their power and can be altered. The fear of our desires keeps them suspect and indiscriminately powerful, for to suppress any truth is to give it strength beyond endurance. The fear that we cannot grow beyond whatever distortions we may find within ourselves keeps us docile and loyal and obedient, externally defined, and leads us to accept many aspects of our oppression as women. [...] And there is, for me, no difference between writing a good poem and moving into sunlight against the body of a woman I love.

The Gospel Matthew 9:35-10:23

DeaconThe Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus and Thaddaeus; Simon the Cananaean and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.

These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Do not take a road leading to gentiles, and do not enter a Samaritan town, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, proclaim the good news, 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' Cure the sick; raise the dead; cleanse those with a skin disease; cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment.

Take no gold, or silver, or copper in your belts, no bag for your journey, or two tunics, or sandals, or a staff, for laborers deserve their food. Whatever town or village you enter, find out who in it is worthy, and stay there until you leave. As you enter the house, greet it. If the house is worthy, let your peace come upon it, but if it is not worthy, let your peace return to you. If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, shake off the dust from your feet as you leave that house or town. Truly I tell you, it will be more tolerable for the land of Sodom and Gomorrah on the day of judgment than for that town.

"I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves, so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves. Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues, and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the gentiles. When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say, for what you are to say will be given to you at that time, for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. Sibling will betray sibling to death and a father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death, and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. When they persecute you in this town, flee to the next, for truly I tell you, you will not have finished going through all the towns of Israel before the Son of Man comes.

Presider	Will you be responsible for seeing that Joaquín is brought up in the Christian faith and life?
Parents and Godparents	I will, with God's help.
Presider	Will you by your prayers and witness help Joaquín to grow into the full stature of Christ?
Parents and Godparents	I will, with God's help.

Then the Presider asks the following questions of the parents and godparents.

Question	Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?
Answer	I renounce them.
Question Answer	Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt the creatures of God? I renounce them.
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Question	Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God?
Answer	I renounce them.
Question	Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior?
Answer	I do.
Question	Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love?
Answer	I do.
Question	Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord?
Answer	I do.

After all have been presented, the Presider addresses the congregation, saying

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support Joaquín in his life in Christ?

	On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven,
	and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
	He will come again to judge the living and the dead.
Presider	Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?
People	I believe in the Holy Spirit,
	the holy catholic Church,
	the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins,
	the resurrection of the body,
	and the life everlasting.
Presider	Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers?
People	I will, with God's help.

Presider People	Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? I will, with God's help.
Presider People	Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ? I will, with God's help.
Presider People	Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? I will, with God's help.
Presider	Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?
People	I will, with God's help.

The Prayers

Let us now pray for Joaquín as he receives this sacrament of new birth.

Leader People	Deliver him, O Lord, from the way of sin and death. Lord, hear our prayer.
Leader People	Open his heart to your grace and truth. Lord, hear our prayer.
Leader People	Fill him with your holy and life-giving Spirit. Lord, hear our prayer.
Leader People	Keep him in the faith and communion of your holy Church. Lord, hear our prayer.
Leader People	Teach him to love others in the power of the Spirit. Lord, hear our prayer.
Leader People	Send him into the world in witness to your love. Lord, hear our prayer.
Leader People	Bring him to the fullness of your peace and glory. Lord, hear our prayer.

The Presider says

Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and forever. **Amen.**

Thanksgiving Over the Water

The Presider blesses the water, first saying

	The Lord be with you.
People	And also with you.
Presider	Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
People	It is right to give our thanks and praise.

We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

At the following words, the Presider touches the water

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior.

To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Baptism

Joaquín, I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Joaquín, you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. **Amen.**

Let us pray.

O God, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon Joaquín the forgiveness of sin and have raised him to the new life of grace. Sustain him, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give him an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. **Amen.**

Let us welcome the newly baptized, saying: We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.





† The Great Thanksgiving

The Rev. Dr. Flora Keshgegian

A St. Mary's parishioner, the Rev. Dr. Flora Keshgegian was among the first cohort of women ordained in the Episcopal Church. Growing up in Philadelphia, she attended public schools and the University of Pennsylvania, followed by a Master of Divinity Degree from the Philadelphia Divinity School and a Ph.D. from the joint doctoral program of Boston College and Andover Newton Theological School. She has taught at Brown University, Seminary of the Southwest, Stonehill College, Church Divinity School of the Pacific, and the Graduate Theological Union.

The Holy One be with you. **And also with you.** Open your hearts to the One who is Love. **We open our hearts to you, O God.** Let us give thanks to God who took on flesh. **For your presence with us, we give you thanks!** O God of life, created and ongoing, from the beginning you brought forth a rich and varied creation and called it good. Your love poured forth as you breathed life into all beings. Whenever we lost our way, you called us back into relationship: offering a rainbow sign to Noah and his companions; freedom and covenant partnership to Moses and the Israelites; and a return from exile following the Judeans' captivity in Babylon. In so many ways and times, you offered us life and revealed the way of loving and just relationship. Then, in your greatest gift of love, you gave us Jesus – flesh of our flesh, Wisdom of your own being – to fulfill your desire for all creation to be one with you. Therefore, we join our voices in acknowledgement and praise, singing:



Jesus lived, taught and healed among the people of Israel, who were sorely oppressed by powers and principalities. Jesus sought out those who were scorned, unrecognized, and fearful. Through his words, actions, and touch, Jesus opened their eyes to new ways of seeing, opened their ears to hearing God's call, and opened their hearts to fullness of love. Embodying the fullness of life with God, Jesus promised life to all whom he encountered. But some could not tolerate this love and sought to do away with Jesus. Knowing what was to come, Jesus gathered with his companions at table. They shared a meal together, as Jesus had done so often, with so many.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Now, gracious God, we ask you to send your Holy Spirit upon this bread and wine, that they may be the Body and Blood of Christ, feeding us to be your people.

With the risen Christ, may we come to share in your ongoing work of justice, healing, and reconciliation. And with great joy, may we enter into the loving dance of your divine multiplicity: three-in-one and one-in-three.

All this we ask through them, the Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **Amen.**

Communion of the People and Healing Prayer

All are welcome at the Lord's Table.

Please sanitize your hands as you come forward to receive Communion. Allow the Priest or Deacon to drop bread into your cupped and outstretched hands. Wine or grape juice may then be consumed by sipping or by intinction (dipping): the chalice containing wine is silver and will be on your left; the goblet containing juice is crystal and will be on your right. If consuming wine/juice by intinction (dipping), please avoid touching the rim of the chalice or dipping your fingers into the wine/juice. You may switch Communion lines if you prefer to receive wine rather than juice, or vice-versa.

If you wish to receive prayer and the laying on of hands, please proceed to the Chapel after receiving Communion. You may request prayer for yourself or on behalf of others – for any reason. All prayer requests will be held in confidence by those who are offering healing prayer today.

† <u>Post-Communion Prayer</u>

After Communion, the Presider says Let us pray.

O God, we give you thanks for this meal which nourishes our hunger for justice, for connection, and for a world that is whole. We long for so much more than a taste. Make us relentless pursuers of your Kingdom, until all your children know themselves as beloved. Amen.

May God the Creator, who made you in God's multi-faceted image, uphold you. May God the Christ, who transgressed boundaries for the sake of love, liberate you.
